



Accreditation

Accreditation supports our ongoing focus on institutional improvement, ensures that we remain accountable to our constituencies, and provides us with a broad framework for action as we work to achieve our mission.

Missouri Western is accredited by the <u>Higher Learning Commission</u> (HLC), one of the seven regional accrediting associations in the United States. HLC accredits institutions of higher education in 19 states and has approximately 1,000 member institutions.

Missouri Western's accreditation was reaffirmed on January 24, 2017 and participates in the Open Pathway. We value the insights provided through the accreditation process and seek to use this information to strengthen our institution.

Foundation

The Missouri Western State University Foundation was established in 1969 as an independent entity to promote private giving to help the University move into the forefront of public higher education. The Foundation encourages, holds, invests and disburses private gifts of cash, securities, appreciated assets and personal property, all toward the goal of providing services, programs and facilities that strengthen the mission of the University. Donations and gifts may be restricted to target specific



interests of the University including scholarships, awards, equipment grants, program funding and capital improvements, or may be unrestricted to assist with the future needs that meet the goals of the institution.

Capital campaigns allow the Foundation to secure private sector resources to perpetuate the distinctive values and contributions of Missouri Western State University. Major gifts to the Foundation have contributed substantially toward the growth of the University and its continuous goal of excellence in such projects as the Fulkerson Center, Spratt Memorial Stadium video scoreboard, Bill Snyder Pavilion, Victory Plaza,

Looney Arena, Leah Spratt Hall, the Glenn E. Marion Memorial Clock Tower, the University Plaza, Kelley Commons, the Walter Cronkite Memorial, and the Agenstein/Remington Halls project, improvements to Potter Hall and the Hearnes Center, and the establishment of the Craig School of Business & Technology.

The Missouri Western Foundation is a tax-exempt corporation; therefore, gifts made through it are tax deductible as appropriate. Its activities are directed by an independent, volunteer board that works closely with the University administration to identify needs and allocate funds. 




MWSU had 3,604 undergraduate students in fall 2023. About 66% were college-level students and 34% were high school students taking college courses. Another 22% were new students attending college for the first time (new first-time freshmen 603 and new transfer students 172.) with the rest continuing.


Graduate student enrollment totaled 213 students: 75 entering students in master's programs and 115 continuing. Another 16 students were pursuing a post-baccalaureate certificate, with 7 non-degree-seeking graduates.

You can see the specific counts as the first number in the data labels for every pie chart, excluding the one on gender (pg.28).

About 20% of MWSU degree-seeking students originated from out-of-state. (High school students taking college courses are non-degree seeking.) In fall 2023, students originated from 34 states and 31 countries.


However, the large majority of students in fall 2023 were from Missouri (80%). The most common other states were Kansas (172), Iowa (61), Nebraska (47), Texas (37), and Illinois (29).






The most common high schools where new freshmen came from in fall 2023 were Central High School (80), Lafayette High School (37), Benton High School (22), Savannah R-III High School (17), and Mid-Buchanan R-V School District (11), but students came from many others.

The most common transfer institutions where new transfer students came from in fall 2023 were Metropolitan Community College-Kansas City (25), North Central Missouri College (16), Northwest Missouri State University (15), University of Missouri-Kansas City (9), and Johnson County Community College (6).



The percentage of degree-seeking undergraduates, who are minority students, grew to 27% in fall 2023, with 68% white or caucasian. The student body is now much more diverse.




MWSU degree-seeking undergraduates are nearly 61% female and 39% male. High school students taking college classes are 37% male in fall 2023, an increase of 4% compared to 2022.


In fall 2023, 14% of degree-seeking

undergraduates were 25 or older. About 12% attended part-time.

Financial aid is often needed by students. About 44% of our degree-seeking undergraduates received a Pell in fall 2023. Another 29% received a subsidized federal loan.



We have seen a significant increase in non-traditional students (aged 25 or older) enrolling fall 2023 compared to fall 2022.



Nearly all college-level undergraduates were pursuing a bachelors (98%) versus a certificate or associates (2%) in fall 2023. Undergraduates pursue a wide variety of majors on campus. The most common majors were nursing (432), psychology (147), biology (135), management (134), exercise science (98), criminal justice (94), elementary education (87), marketing (79), computer science (75), early childhood education (69), business (59), accounting (56), recreation sport management (55), digital animation (52) and others.

At the graduate level only a small number were pursing a certificate in fall 2023 (special reading (3), TESOL, teaching English to speakers of other languages (13). Students pursuing masters degrees were 5.6% of all students in fall 2023 (213). The most common graduate majors in fall 2023 were business



administration (62), assessment (31), teaching (29), sport and fitness management (20), social work (15), and forensic investigations (15).

About 64% of graduate students were female and 36% male in fall 2023. Minority students were 20% of the population with 74% White and 2% International. Another 65% were 25 or older.





Enrollment Demographics: Sex and Ethnicity






Of the degree-seeking undergraduates enrolled in fall 2023, approximately 61% were female. Approximately 27% were students of color, with slightly higher representation of students of color (approximately 30%) among males than females (approximately 25%). Progression and Graduation


First to Second Year Retention Rates



Retention rates for first-time, full-time students have been relatively steady, consistently staying around the low 60% range. The retention rate peaked at 64% in 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 but has slightly decreased to 59% in 2022-2023.

Graduates Over Time





We have observed a consistent improvement in our graduation rates over the past eight years. Starting from 2014, the eight-year graduation rates have progressively

increased, with notable gains across different cohorts. For example, the six-year graduation rate for the 2016 cohort reached 42%, compared to 36% for the 2014 cohort, marking a 6% improvement. This information was updated in Fall 2023.



In academic year 2023-24, we awarded 643 degrees and certificates to 593 individuals. Baccalaureate degrees made up 82.3% (529), master's degrees made up 12.0% (77), associates degrees made up 3.3% (21); 1.7% (11) were certificates, and .7% (5) were graduate certificates. Of the degrees awarded, 65% (418) were to female students and 35% (225) were to male students.






Employment Type










The average loan amount per recipient is \$7,680, with 43.2% of students receiving funds from one or more of the sources shown.
